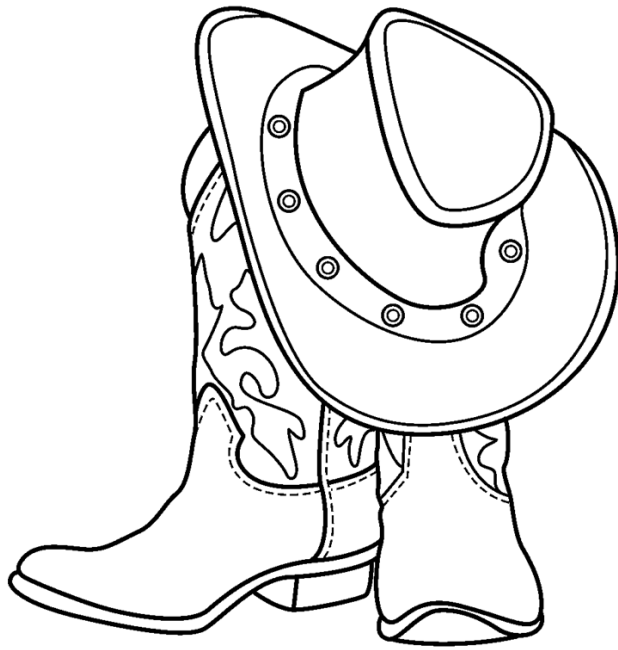

Ambassador Program

August 14, 2024

The Teeswater Agricultural Society would be honoured to have you represent them as the 2024-2025 TEESWATER FAIR AMBASSADOR. This program is open to young males and females between the ages of 17-22, as of Aug 1, 2024 who reside in Teeswater and surrounding areas. We will once again be offering a bursary to the winner upon the successful completion of his or her reign. This is a wonderful opportunity for youth to get involved with the Agricultural Society. This is an excellent opportunity for young people to develop communication skills, leadership opportunities, presentation and interview experience for future job placements, as well as developing a large social network.

Each contestant will:

- Write and present a 2-3 min. speech
- Submit a cover letter and resume ahead of the program so that the judges can review them
- Answer an impromptu question
- Be interviewed by a panel of judges
- Receive a gift basket for participating
- Help out during fair weekend

The Ambassador will have a chance to travel to Toronto for 2 different events; including the OAAS Fair Convention in February and the Ambassadors of the Fair competition at the CNE in August 2025. They will represent the TEESWATER AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY at various activities throughout their year as Ambassador.

The program will be held at the Teeswater Agri-curl on Saturday August 12th with the time to be determined. RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE Teeswater Agricultural Society

1. The exhibition will be held at the Teeswater Agricultural Park (Fair Grounds), and in the Community Centre, Arena, Agri-Curl and buildings of the Teeswater Agricultural Society.
2. All exhibitors must be members of the T.A.S. or pay an exhibitor fee of \$5.00. This will allow the person paying, to compete in any or all departments, providing entry fee requirements are met as per those departments. No membership or exhibitor fee is required for those exhibiting ONLY in School Section, or 4-H Shows (This is part of the T.A.S. sponsorship towards Youth Development). In the case of shows put on by a sanctioning body (Tractor Pull, Saddle Horse Show, etc where the T.A.S. does not take entries or pay prize money) no membership or exhibitor fee to T.A.S. is required, except 1 membership from the sanctioning body itself. **HOWEVER, PLEASE NOTE THAT FAIR BOOKS WILL BE MAILED ONLY TO THOSE ON EITHER THE MEMBERSHIP LIST OR THE EXHIBITOR LIST.** Entry fees are awarded to participants as part of the prize money, and therefore are HST exempt.
3. Every person shall be entitled to become a member of the Society. Memberships in the Society may be purchased at the cost of \$5.00/Single or \$10.00/Family. A family membership includes 2 adults and children 18 and under, as of January 1st, residing at the same residence. This membership entitles the members to one Fair Book .

***ALL MEMBERS PLEASE NOTE: the 2025 Annual Meeting of the Teeswater Agricultural Society will be held January 13, 2025.** Please consider this as your formal notice.

4. The “Everyone Pays” Policy will be in effect at the gates unless you have a pass.
5. Exhibitors are limited to 1 entry per section in all classes, unless otherwise stated. No entry may compete for more than one prize except in livestock classes.
6. The directors believe the duties of the Secretary on the days of the exhibition are to just correct entries and to receive overlooked entries, not to make entries generally.
7. **TELEPHONE INQUIRIES:** Kathie Emke may be reached at 519-357-7860 or email: teeswaterfair@gmail.com. If you get the answering machine please leave your message and our secretary will get back to you A.S.A.P. During the week of the fair, our office will be open, so please call 519-392-8100.

8. All articles for competition in the indoor department to be placed in showroom NO LATER THAN 11:30 AM THE FIRST DAY OF THE FAIR. Judging to commence at 1:00 pm. **Any homecraft articles removed prior to 3:00 pm Sunday will result in all prize money being forfeited.** The Society is not responsible for indoor exhibits not removed by 3:30 pm on Sunday unless arrangements have been made between the exhibitor and the committee in charge. All exhibits in community centre must be removed between 3:00 pm & 3:30 pm on the Sunday of the Fair.
9. No exhibits admitted with any names, initials, or marks thereon, except entry tag.
10. No exhibitors will be allowed in the Community Centre on Friday afternoon of the Fair, while judging is being completed. Once the exhibit is in place, the item being judged is not to be moved again by the exhibitor or the public, except the directors in charge, to formally display your article.
11. All articles entered in the Homecraft Division must be the bona fide product and property of the exhibitor, otherwise no prizes will be awarded. The grain and flowers must be property of the exhibitor and produced on his or her farm or holding this year. The manner of culture or curing to be furnished to the Secretary if desired.
A reward of \$20.00 will be paid to any person furnishing information regarding an exhibitor exhibiting animals or articles not belonging to the exhibitor.
Cattle and other livestock and articles placed on exhibition must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor. When more than one party enters the same article or articles, there must be a partnership having common interest in such an exhibit.
12. In classes T, U, W, WW, X and Y, the point system to determine most points will be 3, 2 and 1 for 1st, 2nd and 3rd. In the event of a tie, the exhibitor with the most firsts will be the winner.
13. In the absence of COMPETITION in any section, or if the stock or articles exhibited are of inferior quality, the judges will exercise discretion as to whether they will award first, second or any prize.
14. No person shall be allowed to interfere with judges while in discharge of their duties. Exhibitors so interfering will forfeit their rights to any premiums to which they may otherwise be entitled. A director will accompany the judges and point out where goods and articles are located.

15. The judges decision will be final, but in the event of any dissatisfaction, the exhibitor will have the privilege of asking judges reason for placing. However, the request must go through proper channels. Ask the director in charge for permission.
16. Any infringement of the rules and regulations will be punished by withholding the prizes, expulsion from the Society or both.
17. The directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to insure the safety of the articles sent to the exhibition, and should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, they will give all assistance in their power towards the recovery of the same, but not make any payment for the value thereof.
18. Notice is hereby given that all kinds of gambling, theatrical, circus of mountebank performance, exhibitions or shows, also the huckstering, or trafficking in fruit, goods or merchandise, is not allowed within three hundred yards of the exhibition grounds or buildings, except under special arrangement with the board.
19. In case of an error occurring in the printing of the prize list, the Directors have the power to rectify the same.
20. The Society will not be held responsible for delivery or Special Prizes either in cash, vouchers, goods, trophies or awards. It is each committees responsibility to collect by Fair Week and authorize or present to the proper winners. Committees are responsible for their own budgets and may elect to issue gate or extra passes to their Judges, officials, and/or exhibitors, but the cost will be added to their section's expenses.
21. In the case of insufficient funds, due to weather or other conditions, the Society reserves the right to pay only a percentage of the prize money to exhibitors.
22. Prize money cheques will be mailed to exhibitors as soon as possible after the fair. If winnings are over \$10.00, membership will be retained for the year 2025. **PLEASE NOTE:** Cheques not cashed by December 31st, 2024 will be considered a donation to the Teeswater Agricultural Society.
23. The society will not hold itself liable for any accidents happening at the Fair. Every Officer and Director shall be indemnified and saved harmless out of the funds of the Society from all cost, charges and expenses incurred in and about any action or suit brought against him/her in respect of any deed performed during the execution of his/her office except where charges or expenses are incurred as a result of his own willful neglect or default.

24. All local youth & service groups may sell tickets at their booth for fundraising purposes as part of the Teeswater Agricultural Society policy of supporting local youth service groups. However, booth space must be booked in the normal manner & regular concession charges will apply. The amount of said invoice will/may be donated back to the group if a receipt is issued for our books.

LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS MUST CARRY THEIR OWN LIABILITY INSURANCE.

25. ATTENTION LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

- A. Each livestock exhibitor is requested to supply his or her own straw at the fair. Maximum one bale per animal, please.
 - B. Check health requirements found in your Sections (cattle and horses). It is recommended that all horses being exhibited at the Fair have a **NEGATIVE COGGINS TEST** within one year of the date of the Fair. The certificate to be made available to the Fair Board Officials.
 - C. Cattle and horses (Saturday) to be on the grounds **NO LATER THAN 10:00 AM AND WILL BE EXPECTED TO REMAIN ON THE GROUNDS AS PART OF THE SHOW TILL 5:00 PM UNLESS PERMISSION IS GIVEN BY THE COMMITTEE IN CHARGE.**
26. Anyone behaving in a disorderly manner or not controlling their animals may be evicted from the fair grounds.

REGISTRATIONS -

27. **4-H Beef Regional Registration** will take place in the Agri-Curl Saturday morning. **ABSOLUTELY NO PARKING ON THE IN-FIELD.** For safety purposes we ask exhibitors to use the north & west sides of the ring. Spectators please use the south & east sides.
28. **South Bruce Jackpot Open Beef Show** must be pre-registered and post marked for August 9, 2023.

There is security on the grounds BUT owners are responsible for their own cattle and equipment

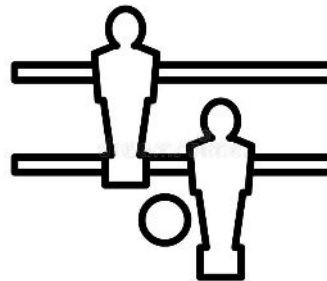

For the purpose of the Classifications, an exhibit shall be interpreted as follows: All animals, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) are considered to be the product of the farm or breeding unit on which they are maintained. In each classification where the same or common interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operations are considered as ONE Breeding Unit. In all cases, where there is any doubt that more than one breeding unit exists, the responsibility of proof of separation of breeding units shall rest with the exhibitor(s).

Definition of Exhibitor:

An exhibitor is any breeder or firm which presents animals or farm produce for official placing by a judge at the time specified by the fair for judging.

Rules:

1. General rules of the Teeswater Fair apply in all cases
2. Livestock exhibitors are responsible for their own liability insurance
3. All cattle must be pre-registered for the 4-H invitational and Open Jackpot Shows
4. All Bulls over 1 year must be shown with nose ring or humbug
5. Each livestock exhibitor must supply his/her own straw at the fair.

Maximum 1 bale per animal, please! Following the show, exhibitors are asked to remove their straw from stalls and take it with them

6. Entries will be tied in barn behind the Agri-Curl Building with performance information posted in stall
7. Vehicles & trailers must be parked outside of the racetrack in the designated area and can be entered in the South Gate (Gordon Street East)
8. Hydro is limited - generators are encouraged
9. 4-H Calves shown must be a member's own project animal and registered within Assist Expo as their multi-county, regional, provincial, or national Projects as of 2024
10. Calves must have CCIA tags and be in good health. Animals not meeting this criterion will be unable to show
11. Any animals that are deemed "unsafe or uncontrolled" by the committee and or judge, will be asked to leave the show ring to prevent injury to other parties

12. THE JUDGE'S DECISION IS FINAL!

13. The directors of the Teeswater Fair have authorized **three (3) exhibits** per class. Definition of an Exhibitor rule will be strictly enforced.

2. Judging at the District Competitions is the responsibility of each OAAS District. Prize money to be paid by the district.
3. All district entries must be registered on the relevant OAAS Championship Entry Form, and returned to the OAAS Convention Administrator, by December 1st.

Provincial Competition

1. Each district is entitled to send one entry into each category of the Provincial Competition. In the case where the district is unable to send the 1st place winner to the convention, then the 2nd place winner eligible to enter.
2. Judges who officiate the Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the OAAS.
3. All entries must be received for judging by the Competition Committee in the designated area by 5pm on the Thursday afternoon of the Annual Convention of the OAAS. Please retain the ticket issued, to claim the entry when the viewing rooms close.
4. A number is assigned to each entry. Entries are only identified by the number during the judging process.
5. Please remove all tags, ribbons, or any other fair/exhibition identification from the entries.
6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the judging and winners have been announced.
7. Any exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process, shall be disqualified and the entry will be removed from the competition.
8. No entry may be removed from the display area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
9. The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident or the negligence of other exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
10. Any protests must be made to the Competition Committee of the OAAS in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the convention.
11. All entries will be judged using the OAAS Judging Standards. Copies of the OAAS Judging Standards can be purchased from the OAAS store at <https://oaasfairs.org/agricultural-society-info/store>.

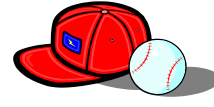

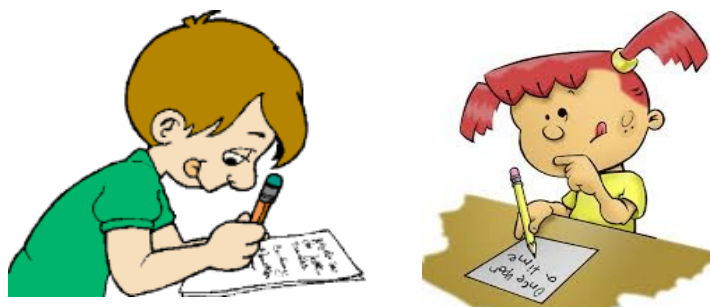
